

## THE 39 STEPS: A LIVE RADIO PLAY

Inspired by Hitchcock's classic tale and performed as a live period radio play, this romantic thriller is a fast-paced ride through the signature world of the Master of Suspense. Richard Hannay is visiting London when he meets Annabella Smith, who is on the run from foreign agents, after a disturbance at a music hall. Later that night, Annabella is murdered and Hannay must then try to break the spy ring and prove his innocence. From an epic train chase to a feisty love interest, Hannay has his work cut out for him as he searches for the truth about The 39 Steps.

What intrigues me about the radio play concept is that it brings a whole new level of immediacy to live theatre by engaging the audience's senses.

"Radio has wings. It has no stage to keep it within the proscenium arch, no camera to confine to things that may be seen," Jerome Lawrence said in his book Off-Mike. "The imagination of the listener is our most ardent and helpful collaborator. It was the theatre of endless possibilities and by bringing this style of theatrical storytelling the audience experiences the magic of a live 1940s radio broadcast. I'd wanted to bring Hitchcock to the stage for years now but wasn't sure of the approach. I considered a biography or stage documentary, but nothing seemed to jell. Then the success of the radio play structure got me thinking that setting Hitchcock's earlier films would nicely fit into the old-time radio period. The blend of simplicity and nostalgia which initially attracted me to the radio play medium continue to inspire me today." Joe Landry Playwright

The 39 Steps is part of a triple feature entitled *Vintage Hitchcock: A Live Radio Play,* which includes adaptations of three early films directed by Alfred Hitchcock: *'The Lodger', 'Sabotage' and 'The 39 Steps'*. The production was premiered in Atlanta, Georgia November 2008.





## FOR THE LOVE OF HITCHCOCK

"Some films are slices of life, mine are slices of cake."

Who doesn't love a good Hitchcock film? He has inspired generations of film makers, playwrights and beyond, is known for his famous cameos and famously described as 'The Master of Suspense'. But what is it about The 39 Steps that has inspired numerous re-makes and adaptations?

Very loosely based on the 1915 adventure novel *The Thirty-Nine Steps* by John Buchan, Hitchcock's The 39 Steps became a major British film of its time. The subject of the film is definitive Hitchcock thriller -- the "wrong man," in this case Mr. Hannay. What The 39 Steps did for Hitchcock is establish a blueprint. Details, plot points, and set pieces are all established that go on to provide a foundation for many of his later works. The wronged man on the run, a woman whose doubt needs reversed and coerced into assistance, showdowns in public venues -- even the act of a man kissing a woman to hide in plain sight from pursuers- all found their footing in The 39 Steps.

Hitchcock had already directed more than a dozen features prior to The 39 Steps, but it is often regarded as his first Hitchcockian film, in that it is the first film to embody the elements for which the filmmaker is most known. It also has the familiar pacing and feel of a Hitchcock piece, albeit a style in development. He controls the pulse of the narrative with moments of tension and those of humour, lingering on pieces with an eye for detail that enrich the story as much as possible. The film established the quintessential English 'Hitchcock blonde' Madeleine Carroll as the template for his succession of ice cold and elegant leading ladies.

Playwright; Joe Landry, has taken classic Hitchcockian elements and transposed them into the show you are about to see. There is mystery, intrigue, suspense, humour and even a few classic Hitchcock film references thrown in for good measure. Enjoy the show and as Hitchcock famously said "There is no terror in the bang, only in the anticipation of it."
