### **PACK OF LIES**

Hugh Whitemore's documentary drama, "An Act of Betrayal" was produced by the BBC in 1971 and was based on the circumstances surrounding the arrest in 1961 of Helen and Peter Kroger on charges of spying for the Russians.

Long after its transmission, the subject of his play continued to excite Whitemore's interest. To quote his own words: "In addition to the themes of loyalty and deception I became increasingly preoccupied with the role of the ordinary citizen in our society. Is it ever possible for the average, relatively powerless, man or woman to make anything more than a token stand against officialdom? Is it not potentially risky to allow the state (albeit for well-argued reasons) greater moral licence than the individual? Or is it, perhaps, naive to expect more than an approximate degree of truthfulness from governments and their spokesmen?"

Pack of Lies was first presented at the Theatre Royal, Brighton, on 11 October 1983 before moving to the Lyric Theatre, London, on 26 October of the same year.

The cast included Michael Williams and Judi Dench as the Jacksons and Larry Hoodekof and Barbara Leigh-Hunt as the Krogers.

## THE KROGERS AND THE PORTLAND SPY RING

Peter Kroger (real name Morris Cohen) was born in New York in 1910 and was educated at Mississippi and Illinois universities. He later fought against Franco in the Spanish Civil War where he was wounded in action. He married Helen (real name Lona) in America in 1941 and served in the American army in Europe during the second world war. Back in New York, they both worked for the spy ring that obtained America's atomic secrets, but when their colleagues, the Rosenbergs, were arrested in 1950 they made their way to England. Peter's new cover as an antiquarian bookseller enabled him to visit book fairs throughout Europe.

A disgruntled Polish Intelligence service officer told the CIA that the Russians had information about British anti-submarine defences and the CIA in turn alerted MI5 and Special Branch. The subsequent investigations became known as the Portland case, involving, among others, Harry Houghton, a clerk at the Naval base, Ethel "Bunty" Gee, a clerk in the Admiralty records office, and Gordon Lonsdale, a Canadian businessman.

The Krogers were implicated through their connection with Lonsdale but it was only after their arrest that an American journalist identified them from a newspaper photo.

The Portland case set off a number of spy scandals - The Vassall affair, the Profumo scandal, the arrest of George Blake and the defection of Kim Philby. The exchange of the Krogers in 1969 (for a lecturer accused of smuggling anti-Soviet literature) exasperated MI5.

The Krogers settled in Lublin, on the Russian-Polish border. Helen died in 1992 and Peter in Moscow in July of this year. They had no children.
